Preliminary Descriptions for Some of the New Courses

These course descriptions are preliminary and may change somewhat during the new course process. Updated descriptions will be published in MyUI once courses appear there.

Legislative Redistricting Seminar

Examination of legal issues surrounding legislative redistricting, including the census and apportionment; "one person, one vote" and the relevant population for drawing districts; objective criteria for drawing maps, and identifying and representing communities of interest; the Voting Rights Act, minority representation, and racial gerrymandering; partisan gerrymandering; independent redistricting commissions and other reforms.

Low Wage Workers

This seminar explores the law of low-wage workers. It discusses how traditional labor and employment law might be insufficient to properly protect these workers. Hence it also focuses on alternative representational institutions such as worker centers, and the special role that federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies and attorneys general are playing in this area. The seminar also dives into the special concerns of particular groups of low-wage workers, which may include workers in agriculture, educational institutions, domestic work, the "gig" economy, restaurants, and retail. Immigrant and prison labor might also be covered. Students will also be coached on producing a seminar paper, which they will have to present to the seminar participants at the end of the term. Students will be evaluated based on their class participation, seminar paper, and class presentation.

Cybercrime and Security

The global reach of the Internet, the low cost of online activity, and the relative anonymity of users has contributed to a wide escalation in cybercrime and in cybersecurity concerns. These are fast-evolving subject areas, and we will discuss current developments and events throughout the course.

The cybercrimes portion of the course will discuss the role that the Internet plays in changing traditional crimes and creates new types of crimes. We will focus on how and why cybercrime is increasing and has become an aggravating problem for the criminal justice system, what are the various constitutional protections afforded to computer users, and how law and policies govern cybercrime detection and prosecution.



Topics will include Fourth Amendment, forensics, electronic surveillance, cyberbullying, identity theft, computer hacking, cyberterrorism, and the challenge of cross-jurisdiction enforcement.

The cybersecurity portion of the course will evaluate the broad range of social-political-economic-legal-ethical-military considerations as digital and information technologies penetrate into almost every aspect of society and allow a broad range of actors to operate in secret. It will introduce the context of cyberinescurity, important macro-elements (such as national security considerations and interests of nation-states), and important micro-elements (such as behavioral economic insights into how people understand and interact with security features). Topics include policymaking (on national, international, and organizational levels), business models, legal frameworks (including duties of security and data privacy issues), standards making, and the roles of users, businesses, and government.

Entrepreneurship Law and Ethics

Entrepreneurship Law & Ethics acquaints students with legal and ethical issues associated with starting and growing a new business. Specific topics include choice of business entity, incorporation process, equity-based compensation, intellectual property protection, venture capital financing and fundraising, and entrepreneurial ethics. Students are also exposed to startup case studies, experiential presentation skills development, and practical realities and insights about entrepreneurship.

Real Estate Transactions

The course examines the acquisition, financing, and development of real estate. Topics include listing agreements, purchase agreements, conveyancing, real estate finance and security instruments, foreclosure, mechanics' liens, and forms of real estate development, including homeowners/condominium associations and other kinds of common interest communities.

Survey of Iowa Law

This course will be a survey of Iowa law. It will cover a variety of subjects, including Iowa Constitutional law, Torts, Criminal Law, and/or other subjects to be determined. It will give students an appreciation of unique aspects of Iowa law as well as exposure to some of the common areas of law that attorneys practicing in Iowa are likely to encounter. It may include guest lectures from practitioners, judges, elected officials, or other visitors.
